Dr. Lydia Brown will explain how Disability Justice analysis enables us to understand the necessary role of ableism in shaping social thought and policy about race, class, gender, sexuality, and nation - and to challenge arbitrary notions of "normal" that undergird oppressive systems and influence our everyday lives.
