Re: Nita M. Lowey 21st Century Community Learning Center (CCLC) Cohort 12 Grant Announcement,

Request for Proposals (RFP)

The Pennsylvania Department of Education (PDE) is pleased to announce the availability of the Nita M. Lowey 21st Century Community Learning Centers (CCLC) Cohort 12 Grant Request for Proposals (RFP). The Cohort 12 application for the 21st CCLC grant will be submitted via the eGrants system starting October 23, 2023. The period of availability is five years, which is anticipated to begin March 1, 2024, and end February 28, 2029, subject to availability of funds from the United States Department of Education (USDE) and satisfactory performance of the grantee in the previous year.

The Nita M. Lowey 21st CCLC grant is a competitive grant that provides federal funding to establish community learning centers that provide academic, artistic, and cultural enrichment opportunities for students and their families. These opportunities must occur during non-school hours or periods when school is not in session to help students attending high-poverty and low-performing schools to meet state and local standards in core academic subjects. Centers must also offer students a broad array of activities that can complement their regular academic programs and literacy and other educational services to their families. The 21st CCLC program is authorized under Title IV, Part B of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, as amended by the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001 and reauthorized by the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) of 2015.

Program Purpose

The purpose of the 21st CCLC program is to provide opportunities for communities to establish or to expand activities in community learning centers that:

- provide opportunities for academic enrichment, including providing tutorial services to help students, particularly students who attend low-performing schools, to meet the challenging State academic standards.
- 2. offer students a broad array of additional services, programs, and activities, such as youth development activities, tutoring, service learning, nutrition and health education, drug and violence prevention programs, counseling programs, arts, music, physical fitness and wellness programs, technology education programs, financial literacy programs, environmental literacy programs, mathematics, science, career and technical programs, internship or apprenticeship programs, and other ties to an indemand industry sector or occupation for high school students that are designed to reinforce and complement the regular academic program of participating students; and
- 3. offer families of students served by community learning centers opportunities for active and meaningful engagement in their children's education, including opportunities for literacy and related educational development.



Funding Availability

PDE will have approximately \$25 million available for Cohort 12 grants. Applicants may choose to provide out-of-school time programming (i.e., before school, afterschool, holidays, weekends, and summer school services) focused on providing opportunities for academic enrichment, including tutorial services to assist students, particularly those who attend low-performing schools and to assist them in meeting the challenging academic standards in kindergarten through grade 12. The performance measures of school attendance, classroom performance, and/or reduced disciplinary referrals and meeting state and local academic achievement standards in reading, math, and science must be addressed by all applicants.

Applicants may request funds ranging from a minimum of \$50,000 to a maximum of up to \$600,000. Programs that propose to provide both school year and summer programming are more impactful for results and data. There will be no summer-only applicants in this grant round. Requests for funding should be based on a maximum per pupil-seat cost of \$2,100 - \$2,548, which includes administrative and transportation costs.

Eligible Applicants

Any public or private organization that meets the eligibility requirements can apply for 21st CCLC funding. This includes public school districts, charter schools, private schools, nonprofit agencies, city or county government agencies, faith-based organizations, institutions of higher education, Indian tribes or tribal organizations, and for-profit corporations. All programs must be implemented through a partnership that includes at least one (1) local educational agency receiving funds under part A of Title I and at least one (1) nonprofit agency, city or county government agency, faith-based organization, institution of higher education, Indian tribe or tribal organization, or for-profit corporation with a demonstrated record of success in designing and implementing before school, after school, summer learning, or expanded learning time activities.

All applicants must target students in the lowest 5 to 10 percent of Title I schools or those listed as focus and priority schools. To be eligible for this grant, at least 85 percent of the students an applicant is proposing to serve must attend: schools that are Title 1, TSI, ATSI, or CSI.

A current list of TSI, ATSI, CSI list of schools is available online.

Current Cohort 10 and 11 grantees are eligible to apply but cannot duplicate services of their current grants or propose to provide services to the identical target population of students. Cohort 12 applicants selected for funding are not eligible to amend their target populations to include current Cohort 10 or 11 grant students once funding for previously awarded grants have ended.

Program Conditions

Programming must be high quality and evidence-based, connected to school day learning and outcomes, conducted in a safe and accessible facility, and offer every participating student a minimum of 300 non-school hours of programming during the school year.

Unsuccessful Applicants are eligible for due process under section 76.401 of Edgar.

Grant Award Process and Key Dates

All potential applicants must complete the following steps:

1. Read grant qualifications – Beginning September 20, 2023, the Cohort 12 grant Request for Proposal (RFP) can be found by visiting PDE's website and using the search keywords 21st CCLC.



- Attend the Grant Writing Webinar (Thursday, September 28, 2023-LEAs, Friday, September 29, 2023-Non-LEAs). Registration for this event is available on the <u>Center for Schools and Communities (CSC)</u> website.
- 3. Notify PDE via email (<u>RA-21stCCLC@pa.gov</u>) of the applicant's intent to submit an application (must be received at the 21st CCLC office by Monday, October 16, 2023). Include in the letter:
 - a. The legal name of the entity.
 - b. The Administrative Unit Number (AUN) and vendor number for the lead organization (to find your AUN, visit the EDNA website).
 - c. The target population to be served by your program including grade levels and proposed site locations.
 - d. Confirmation of school district and schools to be served.
 - e. Community-based organization partners.
 - f. The name of your agency administrator and any agency signatory authority.

Send an emailed letter of intent to the 21st CCLC office at RA-21stCCLC@pa.gov by Monday, October 16, 2023. PDE will then create your entity account which will grant access to the Division of Student Services grants.

- 4. Confirm your access to the eGrants system (if you do not have an AUN number and/or if you have any question regarding eGrants registration, contact Education Administration Supervisor N. Craig Scott at nscot@pa.gov).
- 5. EGrants opens for 21st CCLC Cohort 12 grant applications on Monday, October 23, 2023. Deadline for submission is 12:00 PM on Thursday, November 9, 2023.
- 6. Awarded applicants will be notified by Monday, February 12, 2024.
- 7. Contract effective date anticipated to be Friday, March 1, 2024. Deadline for programs to begin is Monday, June 24, 2024.
